### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

To work towards eliminating discrimination, to promote equality of opportunity and good relations between all persons in the Borough of Charnwood, in the County of Leicestershire.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

To monitor and improve its performance, the trustees have adopted Practical Quality Assurance System for Small Organisations (PQASSO). Under this we review all aspects of policy and procedures, making improvements where necessary.

We endeavour to reflect the diversity of our community in our membership, relationships with people and organisations across the Borough of Charnwood.

#### Advice services:

Welfare benefits & immigration/nationality work on a limited basis provided by volunteers.

We advise and take up individual casework and liaise with the Home Office and other agencies.

Assistance is given in completing necessary forms on various issues, for example housing, education, welfare benefits, immigration and nationality on behalf of service users.

We delivered the 3rd year of our 5 year Big Lottery "Chances For All" project which empowers women from a South Asian background.

During the year we gained a new 5 year Big Lottery project "Improving Lives" which works with men of South Asian background. Part of this included a one-off £15k capabilities grant for an external review of our governance and provision of improvements to meet any identified gaps.

### Debt & Money Management

We delivered a 4 month debt and money management project for Charnwood Borough Council.

#### Youth Training Courses

We run training courses funded by Erasmus Plus through their national agency British Council in the UK.

We have a website which includes material from our trustees and links to other relevant sites www.hrec.org.uk We are on Twitter and Facebook.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

### Financial position

The charity has total unrestricted funds carried forward of £50,059 (2015: £30,652) an increase of £19,407.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

The European Social Innovation Fund is seeking bids to delivering programmes around improving employment chances and holistic inclusion. We have been selected as a delivery partner with several lead bodies, who will be submitting bids during 2016/17.

The trustees will work with our external partner to implement the Big Lottery Capabilities review.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The charity's objects are to work towards eliminating discrimination and to promote equality of opportunity and good relations between all persons in the Borough of Charnwood, in the County of Leicestershire. The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 19 August 2008.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The board of trustees, which has up to 12 members, strives to recruit members able to offer skills appropriate to a Company Limited by Guarantee. New trustees are introduced to the workings of the charity. Trustees are encouraged to identify training needs and attend appropriate external courses. It administers the charity and meets monthly. There are subcommittees responsible for membership, personnel, finance and property, marketing and publicity, and youth.

#### Wider network

Partnership is key to the charity's method of working. Financial support is given by Charnwood Borough Council, The Big Lottery Fund, Lloyds Foundation for England & Wales, The Henry Smith Trust and the British Council to carry out work programmes for them.

The charity also works in partnership with statutory, voluntary agencies and community groups, Loughborough Council of Faiths, Charnwood Refugee and Asylum Seekers Forum, Hate Incident Action Group, The Race Equality Centre (Leicester), Leicester LGB&T Centre and the Minorities of Europe.

#### Risk management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks. A key element in the management of financial risk is the setting of a reserves policy and its regular review by trustees. Trustees have resolved to ensure that the charity is able to continue to provide all services for a period of at least two months in the event of a significant proportion of our income not being realised and also, in the event of having to come to a close, sufficient funds to meet all its obligations.

In order to meet these obligations, the trustees have set a minimum level of £10,000 for the charity's free reserves.

### STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the charitable company's auditors are aware of that information.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The going concern basis is dependent on the charity continuing to receive grant funding. The funding received from Charnwood Borough Council is secure until March 2018, Chances For All project funding is secured until October 2017 and Improving Lives is secure until January 2021. The trustees are confident that the grant funding will continue on a basis that will provide the charity with sufficient resources for the foreseeable future. It is on this basis that the trustees consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis and the financial statements do not include any adjustments that may result should this grant funding not continue.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

To ensure compliance with the accruals concept it may be necessary to defer income into the following period.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses on acquisition.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided using the following rates and bases to reduce by annual instalments the cost, less estimated residual value, of the tangible assets over their estimated useful lives:-

Fixtures and fittings 15% Reducing balance Office Equipment 25% Reducing balance

No depreciation is provided on the charity's property as it is the organisation's policy to maintain this so as to extend it's useful life.

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

The Charity is not required to register for VAT. All income and expenses include VAT where applicable.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

### **Fund accounting**

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the specific fund.

### Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

### 17. MOVEMENT IN FUNDS - continued

The Charnwood Disability Forum is funding towards producing a revised guide for Loughborough to assist the disabled access businesses.

A Lottery capital grant of £49,500 was received towards the building of an extension to the property occupied by the charity. All of this grant was spent in the year it was received but there are continuing restrictions relating to the future use and disposal of the property. The building is not depreciated.

The In Bloom grant is given towards enabling women to take part in "Loughborough In Bloom".

CBC Money Management & Debt represents funding provided from July to October 2015 by Charnwood Borough Council to provide debt and money management advice.

Chances For All is a 5 year Big Lottery project empowering women from a South Asian background.

Improving Lives is a 5 year Big Lottery project empowering men from a South Asian background.

Capabilities Grant is a one-off Big Lottery grant for an external review of governance and provision of improvements to meet any identified gaps.

The Helen Jean Cope Charity have provided a grant for a new heating boiler to be installed.

The Erasmus Plus, through its national agency The British Council, is funding for training events around mainstreaming intercultural learning. These bring together young people from across Europe to Charnwood.

Healthy Cooking is Leicestershire County Council funding to deliver healthy cooking sessions for BAME women.

Henry Smith Charity is funding towards the salary of the Executive Officer.

### 18. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

As stated in note 17 above a grant of £49,500 was received towards the building of an extension to the property owned by the charity. All of this money was spent however there are restrictions relating to the future use and disposal of the property. Should the property be sold or disposed of there may be a liability to repay all or part of the grant.
